Minutes of the Consolidated Lease/Additional Appropriation [Qualified School Construction Bond (QSCB)] Public Hearing, the 2011 Budget Hearing, and the regular meeting of the Western Board of School Trustees held on Tuesday, September 14, 2010 at 6:00 p.m.

Mr. Davidson opened the hearings and meeting with prayer and Mr. Kenworthy led the Pledge of Allegiance

Consolidated Lease/Additional Appropriation [Qualified School Construction Bond (QSCB)] Hearing

Mr. Kenworthy opened the hearing at 6:02 p.m. Purposes were to (1) hold the 1028 public hearing, additional appropriation public lease hearing and public hearing on the form of the amendment to lease; (2) to adopt the 1028/determination resolution to finance projects by entering into an amendment to lease and making additional appropriation; (3) to confirm the amendment to lease, and (4) to sign the amendment to lease. Mr. Qualkinbush, Barnes and Thornburg, presented the current status of the QSCB initiative. Mrs. Singer asked a clarifying question regarding the receipt and disbursement of funds. Mr. Kenworthy asked Dr. O'Rourke if the project costs has been reviewed and updated. Dr. O'Rourke indicated that he had met with Performance Services and that they had updated the costs.

There were no questions or comments from the public.

Mr. Kenworthy made a motion to approve the following resolutions:

1. Resolution Approving Modifications to the Amendment to Lease Agreement
2. Resolution Approving Additional Appropriation

Mrs. Singer seconded the motion which passed 6-0.

Mr. Kenworthy closed the hearing at 6:12 p.m.

Budget Hearing

Mr. Kenworthy opened the hearing at 6:13 p.m. Dr. O'Rourke reviewed the 2011 Budget Estimate and Maximum Estimated Funds to be Raised (Including Appeals) Column entries of School Budget Form 3, and compared these columns to the 2010 entries.

There were no questions or comments from the public.

Mr. Wells made a motion to approve the following:

3. The Tax Neutrality Resolution

Mr. Koloszar seconded the motion which passed 6-0.

Mr. Kenworthy closed the hearing at 6:15 p.m.

Regular Meeting

Item #1 – Opening of the Meeting

Mr. Kenworthy called the meeting to order at 6:16 p.m.

Item #2 – Approval of the Agenda

Dr. O'Rourke indicated that he would like to add an item to the Personnel section of the agenda. Mr. Wells made a motion to approve the agenda as amended by Dr. O'Rourke. Mr. Marley seconded the motion which passed 6-0.

Item #3 – Approval of the Minutes

Mr. Marley made a motion to approve the minutes of the August 17, 2010 regular board meeting. Mr. Koloszar seconded the motion which passed 6-0.

Item #4 – Opportunity for Public Comment

There were no comments from the public.

Item #5 – Steve Meno

Mr. Steve Meno, Fifth Third Securities provided a recommendation to the Board for the refinancing of the outstanding bonds of the Western School Building Corporation First Mortgage Refunding Bonds Series 2001. Thereafter, Mr. Meno presented a resolution to effect the refinancing.

Mr. Marley made a motion to approve the resolution as presented by Mr. Meno. Mr. Kenworthy seconded the motion.

Mr. Kenworthy asked a clarifying question regarding the anticipated new rates and estimated savings.

The motion passed 6-0

Item #6 – Afternoons R.O.C.K. in Indiana

Mrs. Stranahan, Assistant Principal, Western Middle School, presented the following information on the R.O.C.K. program:



AFTERNOONS R.O.C.K.

The Afternoons R.O.C.K. (Recreation, Object lessons, Culture and values, and Knowledge) is a prevention initiative designed to occur during the "three critical hours" of 3 p.m. – 6 p.m., a time when an adult does not usually supervise youth when youth often find themselves tempted by experimentation with alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs; shoplifting and petty theft; vandalism and property crimes; sexual experimentation; fighting, gang activity, and gun violence. The program provides youth with a prescribed strategy of structured and unstructured activities that promote positive social relationships and skills.

- ☆ Free program funded by a Federal Block Grant contracted through Purdue University
- ☆ Family Services Association of Howard County has been awarded a subcontract to provide services
- ☆ Marie Yager is the onsite supervisor provided to WMS through FSA of Howard County
- ☆ All supervisors hold a minimum of a B.S. degree and have the credential of a Certified Prevention Professional through the Indiana Association of Prevention Professionals
- ☆ Program offered October 12 – December 14 on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 2:30-5:15
- ☆ Dr. O'Rourke and Mr. McCracken are working out the funding for transportation home
- ☆ Maximum of 45 students can participate during each 9-week session
- ☆ Ratio of 15 students to 1 staff member; several WMS staff members desire to participate
- ☆ Pre- and Post- surveys are conducted to measure the impact of the program

Mrs. Stranahan and Mrs. Pownall, Principal, Western Middle School said they would like to implement the program, subject to Board approval, semester 1, SY 2010-11 at the Middle School.

Mr. Kenworthy asked what would happen if the school received more requests to participate than the 45 student program limit allows. Lissa responded that they would initiate a waiting list, and, if the program proved successful, offer an additional iteration in the second semester.

In response to a question from Mrs. Singer, Julie and Lissa both indicated that there would be professional development opportunities for participating teachers.

Mrs. Singer also asked if the kids were asked to make a commitment to finish the program once it started. Lissa indicated that such commitment was required and encouraged. Mrs. Singer added that continuity of participation is very important.

Mr. Marley asked if any discipline issues occurring at the program would carry into the regular school day. Mrs. Stranahan responded that such issues, unless extremely grave, would not carry.

Mrs. Singer made a motion to approve the R.O.C.K. program as requested by the middle school principals. Mr. Davidson seconded the motion which passed 6-0.

The principals then presented information on the following new programs in the middle school:

1. Participation in the "Blush" program, a series of activities aimed at encouraging student modesty in dress, speech and behavior.
2. Participation in the Homework Club, a k-12 program sponsored by the Kokomo Housing Authority to Pine-Valley kids.
3. A 9 week program sponsored by Howard County case workers to 7th graders, focusing on positive/caring relationships.

Item #7 – Panther Pride

Dr. O'Rourke commended the following to the Board:

1. Western Middle school's "Pink Panther" team was the top team in the entire county for the American Cancer Society sponsored Relay for Life.
2. Shannon Blaisdell's receipt of completion for her Master of Science degree in Education from Indiana University Kokomo.
3. Dr. Hendrich, Intermediate School principal, for the outstanding job performance as reflected in a parent letter.

Mr. Wells made a motion to approve the Treasurer's Report and claim docket. Mr. Marley seconded the motion which passed 6-0.

2. Director of Transportation: Mrs. Cooke submitted the following report:

September 2010 School Board Meeting

Transportation –

Has been a particularly “challenging” start to a new school year. Several factors have contributed to the normal chaos –

- + Changes in times and locations for special ed transportation and Head Start transportation – we have three new schools that we are transporting students to this year, and a total of eight different locations.
- + Although we do not promise transfer students transportation, we make every effort to find a location that they can be picked up from that works for them and their individual situation. We have 26 new transfer students that we have placed on a bus and several others that were already on a bus from last year.
- + Designated bus stops – change is always hard and we anticipated some response regarding the utilization of designated bus stops and we weren’t disappointed! I do think that, overall, parents understand that schools are facing fiscal challenges that cannot be ignored.

Mark Robertson, our driver trainer, and I completed the bus safety training for kindergartners the week of August 30th. There were five sections in all and most of the kids seemed to really listen and were excited to be part of the bus safety team at Western. I was happy to hear from a driver that when the students got on her bus, they were

telling her all about the safety rules that they had learned and why they were so important. We always have something to hand out to them and this year they got pencils with bus erasers on them - seemed to be a hit!

Each year I ride every route at least once - three down and 21 to go!! I use these ride-a-longs for several things – to observe the driver and his or her safety practices, to stay familiar with each route, and to continually assess bus stops and any concerns that may come up.

Security

I am working on getting the “fix” to our ID badges to all the buildings to distribute. Although, not an ideal one, it will solve the problem of the fading pictures, and any picture taken from now on will not have the “fading” issue that the originals have.

Building Projects

- ❖ We have received the recommendations from Mr. John Beechy of Mawr Design, Inc. We hired Mr. Beechy to manage the quotes on the excavating and asphalt part of the Aux. Parking lot project at the south end of our property. We wanted a third party to evaluate and recommend the lowest and most responsible quotes for this project. The school is buying the gravel itself to save money. It will be Stephens Bulldozing for the excavating and drainage tile work and I am showing you the quote from E & B Paving for the asphalt work. We have three to four quotes on both aspects of this project. We will be starting it this month.
- ❖ All of the summer projects are now complete and I am working with Performance Services on the bond project and will get with Dr. O'Rourke when more information is available.
- ❖ I would like to extend an invitation to all of the board members to tour the Water Plant if you would like to see how it works and looks. Our water test so far have returned back better than we had hoped for.
- ❖ As I always say, if there is any questions please feel free to call me anytime.

Pat Grzesiak – Director of Maintenance

Several Board members asked questions regarding the softball parking lot project to include:

- a. Mrs. Singer asked what the projected savings was on the gravel arrangement. Mr. Grzesiak indicated that he thought it would be \$1500.
- b. Mr. Wells indicated that the vendor who will do the excavating and drainage should fill out a conflict of interest statement, since the spouse is an employee.
- c. Mrs. Singer asked a question regarding the amount of asphalt to be used for the project.

In another matter, Mr. Marley asked a question regarding the usage schedule of the bathrooms located near the softball field. Dr. O'Rourke indicated that he and Mr. Grzesiak would look into it.

Dr. O'Rourke indicated that per Board policy, he needed a Board vote on the asphalt work.

Mr. Marley made a motion to accept the E&B Paving, Inc, Package B, 3" asphalt quote of \$50,401.00.

Mr. Kenworthy seconded the motion which passed 6-0.

4. Director of Technology: Mr. Taylor was not in attendance, but had previously submitted the following report:

Technology Director Report

September 7, 2010

Phone Issues

We have been dealing extensively with AT&T and our phone circuit. We have experienced numerous incidents in which we have lost the ability to receive or make outside phone calls. AT&T technicians have been on site twice to fix the problem and it appears that the most recent fix has been successful. We are continuing to monitor the situation and I am hopeful that our intermittent outages have been resolved.

Start of School

I feel that we got off to a very good start to the school year. We are having some issues with the new nComputing labs that we installed in the 8th grade lab and in one of the 1:1 high school English classrooms. This is a brand new technology and the company has been very good to work with us thus far and we are receiving daily reports/updates on fixes and patches that are available.

My Big Campus

I am in the process of configuring a classroom resource that we are going to pilot in Mr. Schmidt's 1:1 classroom. My Big Campus is a feature of our Lightspeed program that we already own that allows us to create classroom groups for sharing of resources and collaboration tools.

State Reporting

This is the first time we have started school with the Real Time weekly upload to the state. It has been a significant chore to deal with students that finished the 2009-2010 school year here at Western but did not return this school year. We are being required to submit an individual record for each of these students to avoid conflicts with other schools. We are also in the process of finalizing our Title I data submission as we had to wait until the completion of the Jump Start session to complete that data.

Student Information System

I am going to be gathering data on three different Student Information systems that I believe should be considered for upgrading our system that is nearing the end of life cycle. I will be scheduling meetings and product demonstrations with these vendors the next couple of months to gather input from all stake holders.

6. Superintendent: Dr. O'Rourke submitted the following report:

1. Education JOBS Funding:

U.S. Department of Education Program recently passed by Congress. Western's share is \$431,441.

The U.S. Department of Education requires the Education Jobs funds be spent by September 2012. I will reserve the use of these one-time funds until we are sure about funding levels budgeted by the General Assembly.

These monies will be distributed to Western through Indiana's school funding formula.

I have included some information on how these funds can be used.

2. Student Numbers vs. New Dollars:

In anticipation of the SY 2010-2011 ADM count – September 17, 2010, here are some student numbers, still unofficial at this writing. Additionally, be aware that the December and May ADM counts will not be required this year. Also note, that there is a legislative committee studying the current funding formula.

Note: ADM Comparisons: SY 09-10=2428; SY 10-11=2481.5(est.). Numbers are less than above since K numbers only count for ½ ADM. Also, since the projected SY 10-11 ADM count is 53.5 students higher than SY 09-10, one would expect a large increase in revenues. Unfortunately, this is not the case, due to the current funding formula. I will provide more info on this at the Board meeting.

3. Items of interest for your reflection and thought:

- a. According to the Cambridge Massachusetts based Schott Foundation for Public Education, only 47% of America’s black males graduated from high school on time, SY 07-08, as compared to 78% of white males.
- b. According to a survey administered by the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse, based at Columbia University, 27% of public school students, ages 12 to 17 say that their schools have gangs and that drugs are used, kept, or sold on school grounds.
- c. Tying educator evaluations to teacher performance (on standardized student tests) and salary determinations is a very hot topic across America.
- d. Common Core Standards, National Curricula and National Testing is another very hot topic across America. A related issue is the deterioration of local control.
- e. There is a great debate emerging around the over-emphasis on data in student education. Some feel that, “the more educators allow themselves to be turned into accountants, the more trivial their teaching becomes and the more trivial their teaching becomes and the more their assessments miss” (Alfie Kohn)
- f. A study, funded by the Institute of Education Services, a branch of the U.S. Department of Education, indicates that students involved in extracurricular activities and subject to in-school random drug testing reported using drugs less often than their peers in high schools that didn’t have drug-testing programs.
- g. A study, commissioned by the New York based Wallace Foundation, devoted to examining the traits of effective school principals has found that high student achievement is linked to “collective leadership”: the combined influence of educators, parents, and others on school decisions.
Other results include:
 - i. Successful principals “were setting the conditions that enabled the teachers to be better instructors”
 - ii. It is important for principals to stay in one school in order to build those effective partnerships among teachers and parents

- iii. You need to have professional development that is ongoing and iterative
- iv. The most effective principals were the ones who were able to use data and show teachers how to use the information
- v. Stability in leadership is important

This year, our Principal Evaluation Model, started last year, will also include the Assistant Principals. We are currently identifying two books for study, one of which will be on the topic of data use in decision-making. All of the Principals said they gained from last year's program and we hope to continue to refine the process this year.

Additionally, Dr. O'Rourke provided a copy of the latest 2011 State Tuition Support Worksheet, based upon current, projected, 2011 ADM numbers for the Board's information.

Mrs. Singer asked and Dr. O'Rourke complied, that he provide final ADM numbers and class size information at the October 2010 regular Board meeting.

Item #9 – Title IIA Grant Application

Mr. Wells made a motion to approve the Title II, Part A: Improving Teacher Quality 2010-2011 Application. Mr. Koloszar seconded the motion which passed 5-0. [Note: Mr. Davidson had to leave the meeting early and, therefore, was not available for this or subsequent voting requirements]

Item #10 – School Improvement Plan

Rick Davis presented for Board approval the Western High School Improvement Plan. The plan focuses improvement on three goals: Improving Reading Performance, Improving the Attendance Rate, and Improving the Graduation Rate. During the 2009-2010 school year each of the School Improvement Goal Action Teams developed a plan that put forth multiple strategies or interventions for each goal. Paramount to the whole improvement process was the creation of what is known as the Wednesday Enrichment Block (WEB). The WEB involves modifying the Wednesday schedule to allow for a block of time for specific reading strategy instruction alternating with other enrichment lessons. The title of WEB was chosen for reasons much deeper than the obvious acronym of Wednesday Enrichment Block. Western's WEB is the High School's effort to catch their students and help them find success. One strand of the WEB is the effort to improve reading with research-based best practice strategies. Another strand focuses on the aspect of attendance, and another strand focuses on the closely related graduation rate. Another strand of this WEB is the intentional effort for teachers to "get to know" a specific group of students on a much deeper level than can usually be attained in normal teacher-student interactions. Through the school improvement plan Western High School is working to catch all of their students in their WEB and help them find success in both school and life.

Mrs. Singer said the plan is very comprehensive and that she was still studying the details. She also asked about the use of formative assessments and their use in supporting ISTEP+ score monitoring. Mr. Davis indicated that since the high school has now switched to the state mandated ECA testing procedure, it becomes harder to establish such casual or correlative relationships.

Mr. Wells asked how often the high school does data calculation. Mr. Davis indicated every three years. Mr. Kenworthy moved to approve the Western High School Improvement Plan. Mr. Marley seconded the motion which passed 5-0.

Item #11 – Acceptance of Grant
